PROCLAMATION MADE PURSUANT TO SECTION 100 OF THE CUSTOMS ORDINANCE 1951 PRO-HIBITING THE EXPORTATION OF CERTAIN GOODS.

PROCLAMATION.(1)

Customs Ordinance 1951.

PROHIBITION OF EXPORTATION OF CERTAIN GOODS.

WHEREAS by Section 100 of the Customs Ordinance 1951 it is amongst other things provided that the Administrator may by Proclamation prohibit the exportation of any goods the exportation of which would in his opinion be harmful to the Territory and that the power to prohibit the exportation of any goods shall extend to authorize the prohibition of the exportation of goods generally or to any specified place, and either absolutely or so as to allow of the exportation of the goods subject to any condition or restriction:

And whereas I am of the opinion that the exportation of the goods specified in the First Schedule hereto would be harmful to the Territory, and that the exportation of the goods specified in the Second Schedule hereto would be harmful to the Territory unless the goods were exported with the prior written consent of the person (if any) respectively specified in that Schedule and unless the conditions (if any) respectively specified in that Schedule were observed:

Now therefore I, Jack Keith Murray, Administrator of the Territory of Papua and New Guinea, in pursuance of the powers conferred by Section 100 of the said Ordinance and all other powers me enabling, do hereby prohibit the exportation from the Territory of—

- (a) the goods specified in the First Schedule hereto; and
- (b) the goods specified in the Second Schedule hereto except with the prior written consent of the person (if any) and upon the conditions (if any) respectively specified in that Schedule, in relation to those goods.

Given under my Hand at Port Moresby, this fifteenth day of November, One thousand nine hundred and fifty-one, and in the fifteenth year of his Majesty's reign.
