TEXT OF PROCLAMATION.

[Proclamation dated 13th May, 1950, and published in Papua and New Guinea Govt. Gaz. of 20th May, 1950.]

PROCLAMATION. (2)

Customs Ordinance 1921-1941 of the Territory of New Guinea.

WHEREAS by section 45⁽¹⁾ of the Customs Ordinance 1921-1941 of the Territory of New Guinea it is amongst other things provided that all goods the importation of which is prohibited by Proclamation are prohibited imports:

And whereas by section 49 of the said Ordinance it is provided that the power of prohibiting importation of goods shall authorize prohibition subject to any specified conditions or restrictions and that goods imported contrary to any such conditions or restrictions shall be prohibited imports:

PART C: CUSTOMS-

Now therefore I, Jack Keith Murray, Administrator appointed under the Papua and New Guinea Act 1949 in pursuance of the powers conferred by the Customs Ordinance 1921-1941 of the Territory of New Guinea and all other powers me enabling, do hereby prohibit the importation from Australia or New Zealand into the Territory of New Guinea all animals, animal products and birds unless accompanied by a certificate to the satisfaction of the Chief of the Division of Animal Industry in the said Territory, of freedom from disease, given by some person who is, in the opinion of the Chief of the Division of Animal Industry, competent to give such certificate:

Provided that no such certificate shall be required in connexion with the importation from Australia or New Zealand into the Territory of New Guinea of the following animal products:—

- (a) Meat imported for human consumption;
- (b) Fertilizer which has been sterilized in Australia or New Zealand; and
- (c) Dairy products and eggs imported for human consumption:

And I do further prohibit the importation from any place outside Australia and New Zealand into the Territory of New Guinea of all animals, animal products and birds unless with the consent of the Chief of the Division of Animal Industry first had and obtained.

PROCLAMATION(1)

By His Honour Frederick Beaumont Phillips, a Deputy of the Administrator of the Territory of Papua and New Guinea.

WHEREAS by section 101 of the Customs Ordinance 1921-1941 of the Territory of New Guinea, it is amongst other things provided that the Administrator may by Proclamation prohibit the exportation

of any goods the exportation of which would in his opinion be harmful to the Territory, and that the power to prohibit the exportation of any such goods shall extend to authorize the prohibition of the exportation of goods generally or to any specified place and either absolutely or so as to allow of exportation of the goods subject to any condition or restriction:

And whereas it is provided by the Ordinances Interpretation Ordinance 1949 that any reference, inter alia, in an Ordinance of the Territory of New Guinea to the Administrator shall be read as a reference to the Administrator of the Territory of Papua and New Guinea:

And whereas I am of opinion that the exportation of copra would be harmful to the Territory of New Guinea unless it is exported in accordance with this Proclamation:

Now therefore, I, Frederick Beaumont Phillips, a Deputy of the Administrator of the Territory of Papua and New Guinea, by virtue of the powers conferred by the said section 101 of the Customs Ordinance 1921-1941 of the Territory of New Guinea and all other powers me enabling, do hereby prohibit the exportation from the Territory of New Guinea of copra unless the written consent of the Administrator has first been obtained.

Customs Ordinance 1921-1941 of the Territory of New Guinea.

VARIATION IN THE PROHIBITION OF EXPORT OF CERTAIN TIMBER.

WHEREAS by section 101 of the Customs Ordinance 1921-1941 of the Territory of New Guinea, it is among other things provided that the Administrator may by Proclamation prohibit the exportation of any goods the exportation of which would in his opinion be harmful to the Territory, and that the power to prohibit the exportation of any such goods shall extend to authorize the prohibition of the exportation of goods generally or to any specified place, and either absolutely or so as to allow of the exportation of the goods subject to any condition or restriction:

And whereas by Proclamation⁽²⁾ dated the second day of May, One thousand nine hundred and forty-one, and published in the Territory of New Guinea Government Gazette of the 6th May, 1941, the exportation of sawn timber scantlings and boards was prohibited unless the consent in writing of the Administrator has first been obtained:

And whereas it is desired to permit the exportation of certain case timbers:

Now therefore, I, Jack Keith Murray, Administrator of the Territory of Papua and New Guinea, by virtue of the powers conferred by section 101 of the Customs Ordinance 1921-1941 of the Territory of New Guinea and all other powers me enabling, do hereby revoke the Proclamation⁽²⁾ dated the second day of May, One thousand nine hundred and forty-one, and published in the Territory of New Guinea Government Gazette of the 6th May, 1941, and I do hereby prohibit the exportation of Sawn Timber Scantlings and Boards unless the consent in writing of the Administrator has first been obtained, provided that case timbers cut to size and bundled into shooks may be exported if in the opinion of the Chief Collector of Customs the case timbers have been cut solely from species not suitable for building purposes or from off-cuts not suitable for building purposes of other species.

PROHIBITED EXPORTS.

Now therefore, I, Jack Keith Murray, the Administrator of the Territory of Papua and New Guinea, by virtue of the powers conferred by section 101 of the Customs Ordinance 1921-1941 of the Territory of New Guinea and all other powers me enabling, being of the opinion

that the exportation of Canned Meats and Fancy Meats would be harmful to the Territory do hereby proclaim and declare that for any purpose other than for—

(a) Ship's or aircraft stores for consumption on board; or

(b) as part of the contents of any parcel not exceeding eleven pounds in weight consigned by post to the United Kingdom, the exportation from the Territory of such meats is prohibited.

CUSTOMS TARIFF (NEW GUINEA) ORDINANCE 1950.(1)

No. 5 of 1950.

An Ordinance to amend the Customs Tariff Ordinance 1933-1948 of the Territory of New Guinea.

BE it ordained by the Governor-General in and over the Commonwealth of Australia, with the advice of the Federal Executive Council, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the Papua and New Guinea Act 1949, as follows:—

Short title and citation.

- 1.—(1.) This Ordinance may be cited as the Customs Tariff (New Guinea) Ordinance 1950.⁽¹⁾
- (2.) The Customs Tariff Ordinance 1933-1948⁽²⁾ of the Territory of New Guinea is in this Ordinance referred to as the Principal Ordinance.
- (3.) The Principal Ordinance, as amended by this Ordinance, may be cited as the Customs Tariff Ordinance 1933-1950.
