DECLARATION OF FORBIDDEN SETTLEMENT.

WHEREAS by Regulation 101 of the Native Regulations, 1939, made under the Native Regulation Ordinance, 1908-1930, of the Territory of Papua, it is amongst other things provided that the Lieutenant-Governor in circumstances set out in the said regulations may declare any settlement of Natives in any particular locality to be a "Forbidden Settlement":

And whereas by the provisions of the Ordinances Interpretation Ordinance 1949 any reference in an Ordinance of the Territory of Papua to the Lieutenant-Governor should be read as a reference to the Administrator of the Territory of Papua and New Guinea:

And whereas it has been reported to the Administrator of the Territory of Papua and New Guinea by the Magistrate for Native Matters of the Delta Court of Petty Sessions District of the Territory of Papua that the settlement of Iari Natives at Hevasea Village in the Delta Division of the said Territory is objectionable for the reasons fully stated in the said report:

Now therefore, I, Jack Keith Murray, the Administrator of the Territory of Papua and New Guinea, hereby declare that the settlement of Iari Natives at the village of Hevasea in the Delta Division of the Territory of Papua is a Forbidden Settlement and I further declare that such settlement shall be abandoned on or before the fifteenth day of August, One thousand nine hundred and fifty, and that the Iari Natives of such settlement shall remove on or before the said stated time to a place or places within the said Delta Division which are ordinarily occupied or used by them or to the use and occupation of which they are entitled by any Native right or custom.

Declared by me at Port Moresby, this twenty-eighth day of July, One thousand nine hundred and fifty, and in the fourteenth year of His Majesty's reign.

and at Ataifu Village in the Upper Ataifu Valley both in the Central Division of the Territory of Papua are Forbidden Settlements and I further declare that such settlements shall be abandoned on or before the twenty-first day of February, One thousand nine hundred and fifty-two, and that the Kunimaipa-Karuama Natives of such settlements shall remove on or before the said stated time to a place or places within the said Central Division which are ordinarily occupied or used by them or to the use and occupation of which they are entitled by any Native right or custom.

Declared by me at Port Moresby, this fourteenth day of November, One thousand nine hundred and fifty-one, and in the fifteenth year of His Majesty's reign.
