Title.

An Act to Amend the Cook Islands Act, 1915. [29th October, 1948]

BE IT ENACTED by the General Assembly of New Zealand in Parliament assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows:—

1. This Act may be cited as the Cook Islands

- Amendment Act (No. 2), 1948, and shall be read together with and deemed part of the Cook Islands Act, 1915 (hereinafter referred to as the principal Act).
- 2. The principal Act is hereby amended by inserting, after section two hundred and forty-one, the following new sections:—
- "241A. Every one is liable to five years' imprisonment with hard labour who unlawfully enters or is in any dwellinghouse by night with intent to commit a criminal offence therein, or who is found by night in any dwellinghouse without lawful justification for his presence there.

(2) Section five hundred and sixty-four of the principal Act is hereby amended by omitting from subsection two the words "No such payment shall, except where otherwise expressly provided, exceed the sum of twenty shillings per week, and ".
