KING'S REGULATION

TO FACILITATE MARRIAGES BETWEEN BRITISH
SUBJECTS RESIDENT IN THE PROTECTORATES
AND BRITISH SUBJECTS RESIDENT IN THE
UNITED KINGDOM.

Made by His Britannic Majesty's High Commissioner for
the Western Pacific under the provisions of the Pacific
Order in Council, 1893.

In the name of His Majesty, George the Fifth, by the
Grace of God of the United Kingdom of Great
Britain and Ireland and of the British Dominions
beyond the Seas King, Defender of the Faith,
Emperor of India.

[13th February, 1917.]

1. This Regulation may be cited for all purposes as the SHORT TITLE.
Marriage of British Subjects (Facilities) Regulation 1917.

2. In this Regulation:—

INTERPRETATION

“Protectorate” means any island, group of islands,
or place under the jurisdiction of His Britannic
Majesty's High Commissioner, except the Gilbert
and Ellice Islands Colony.

3. Where a marriage is intended to be solemnised or
contracted in the United Kingdom between a British
subject resident there and a British subject resident in
a Protectorate a certificate for marriage may be issued
in the Protectorate by a Registrar of Marriages appointed
under “The Pacific Islands Civil Marriages Order in
Council 1907,” in the like manner as if the marriage was
to be solemnised or contracted under circumstances

requiring the issue of such certificate and as if both such British subjects were resident in the Protectorate.
