12	Section 1. Short Title.
13	This Chapter may be cited as the Human Rights Committee Act, 2015.
14	
15	Section 2. Interpretation.
16	In this Chapter, unless the context otherwise requires:
17	"Bill of Rights" means the Bill of Rights contained in Article II of the Constitution of the
18	Republic of the Marshall Islands;
19	"CEDAW" means the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination
20	against Women as adopted by the United Nations on 18 December 1979 and
21	entering into force on 3 September 1981;
22	"Committee" means the Human Rights Committee established section 4;
23	"complainant" means a person who submits a complaint to the Committee under this
24	Act;
25	"CRC" means the Convention on the Rights of the Child as adopted by the United
26	Nations on 20 November 1989 and entering into force on 2 September 1990;

12	the Marshall Islands is a State Party, and any other core or other international
13	human rights treaties to which the Marshall Islands may become a State Party;
14	"Minister" means the Minister in assistance;
15	"respondent" means the person against whom a complaint is made under this Act;
16	"UN Human Rights Council" means the inter-governmental body within the United
17	Nations responsible for strengthening the promotion and protection of human
18	rights around the world, addressing and making recommendations on situations of
19	human rights violations, and discussing thematic human rights issues and
20	situations that require its attention;
21	"UPR" means the Universal Periodic Review;

"Working Group" means the Working Group established under section 9.

2	The purpose	e of this Act is to:
3	(a)	establish a multi stakeholder body to promote the human rights of all persons
4		living in the Marshall Islands;
5	b)	promote the implementation of international human rights standards, including
6		international human rights treaties to which the Marshall Islands is a State Party;
7	(c)	promote an inclusive and coordinated cross-sectoral approach to the
8		implementation of human rights reporting and programs;
9	(d)	promote understanding of and compliance with the Bill of Rights and legislation
10		promoting human rights, including the Domestic Violence Protection and
11		Prevention Act 2011, the Child Protection Act 2015, and the Rights of
12		Persons with Disabilities Act 2015; and
13	(e)	establish a complaints mechanism for the redress of human rights violations.
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15		PART II - HUMAN RIGHTS COMMITTEE
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17	Section 4.	Establishment of the Human Rights Committee.
18	(1) The	Human Rights Committee, formerly known as the Resources Development
19	Con	nmittee, is established.
20	(2) The	Committee comprises multi-stakeholder members from the following Government
21	offic	ces, private sector, and civil society organizations:
22	(a)	Chief Secretary, who is the Chairperson;
23	(b)	Secretary of Internal Affairs, who is the Vice Chairperson;

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1		(c)	Secretary of Foreign Affairs;

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Section 5. Functions of the Committee.

- 3 The Committee is responsible for the following:
- 4 (a) providing a consultative forum to address human rights issues;
- 5 (b) supporting the development of policy, legislative, administrative and other 6 measures, including national strategic plans of action and monitoring tools, to 7 progressively implement international human rights standards;
 - (c) monitoring implementation of international human rights obligations;
 - (d) providing advice and making recommendations, including setting out the implications of any proposed law or any proposed policy, to Cabinet on matters relating to compliance with human rights standards;
 - (e) preparing national reports to the UPR and human rights treaty bodies in a timely manner and according to the relevant guidelines, and following up on recommendations by all international human rights mechanisms;
 - (f) receiving and investigating complaints of human rights violations, in accordance with the complaints procedure under Part IV;
 - (g) resolving complaints by settlement and referring unresolved complaints to the Attorney General's Office for further action;
 - (h) promoting the mainstreaming of the rights of women, children, persons with disabilities, and other vulnerable groups, into sectoral development plans and strategies;
- 22 (i) coordinating inclusive consultations, including inviting and receiving
 23 representations, on human rights with:

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1			(i) a broad range of stakeholders, including children, women, persons with
2			disabilities, the elderly, and other marginalized groups; and
3			(ii) representative organizations of stakeholders under paragraph (i).

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Functions of the Chairperson. Section 7. 1 The Chairperson, or in his or her absence, the Deputy Chairperson, is responsible for: 2 the efficient discharge of the Committee's functions; (a) 3 calling meetings and notifying Committee members; (b) 4 5 (c) inviting specialists to attend meetings when required by the Committee; chairing Committee meetings according to the agenda; (d) 6 ensuring all discussion items end with a decision, action or definite outcome; 7 (e) (f) reviewing and approving the draft minutes of meetings before distribution; 8 discussing and tabling with relevant Ministers, decisions taken by the Committee; 9 (g) 10 and (h) any related matters. 11 12 Section 8. Meetings of the Committee. 13 The Committee must meet on the third week of every other month or when called by the 14 (1) Chairperson, at a time and place the Chairperson appoints. 15 (2) The Chairperson may call a special meeting, on receiving a written and signed request 16 17 from at least five members. 18 (3) At any meeting, a quorum is formed by five members of which at least two members 19 must not hold positions in Government. **(4)** The Chairperson must preside at every meeting at which he or she is present, and in the 20 21 absence of the Chairperson, the Deputy Chairperson must preside. 22 (5) If the Chairperson and Deputy Chairperson are both absent from a meeting, other

members present must elect one (1) of them to preside at the meeting.

12	A complaint	s sub-committee must investigate any complaint received by it, unless before
13	commencing	or during the investigation it decides not to do so because -
14	(a)	the complaint is not within the jurisdiction of the Committee;
15	(b)	the complaint is manifestly ill-founded or not sufficiently substantiated;
16	(c)	the complainant, or a person acting on his or her behalf, has brought proceedings
17		relating to the same matter in a court or tribunal;
18	(d)	the complainant has available another remedy or channel of complaint that the
19		complainant could reasonably be expected to use;
20	(e)	the complainant has not a sufficient interest in the complaint;
21	(f)	the person alleged to be aggrieved does not desire that the complaint be
22		investigated or withdraws the complaint; or
23	(g)	the complaint has been delayed too long to justify any investigation.

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Section 18. Investigation.

- A complaints sub-committee, after receipt of a complaint, must decide as soon as reasonably practicable what further evidence it requires, if any, and invite the
- 5 respondent to respond to the complaint in writing.
- If the complaints sub-committee considers that the complaint is manifestly ill-founded or not sufficiently substantiated, or that in all the circumstances of the complaint, it is unnecessary to take further action, the complaints sub-committee may decide to take no further action.
- 10 (3) If the complaints sub-committee decides not to proceed, it must advise the complainant of 11 the decision in writing, giving reasons for the decision.
- 12 (4) If the complaints sub-committee decides to proceed to investigate the complaint, it must 13 advise the complainant, any other person claiming to be aggrieved, and the respondent, 14 that the complaints sub-committee intends to investigate the complaint, and must:
- 15 (a) give details of the complaint;
- 16 (b) invite the respondent to respond to the complaint within a specified period (being not less than 21 days);
- 18 (c) advise the parties that upon receipt of any response or upon expiration of the time 19 allowed, the complaints sub-committee may seek any further information in 20 relation to the complaint or response; and
- 21 (d) advise the parties that in the absence of any response, the complaints sub-22 committee may make a recommendation in respect of the complaint.

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Section 19. Settlement.

- 3 (1) At any time after receipt of a complaint, and any time during investigation of a
- 4 complaint, a complaints sub-committee may assist the parties to reach a settlement.
- 5 (2) A settlement means an agreement between the parties on actions that will settle the matter
- 6 and includes:
- 7 (a) the payment of compensation;
- 8 (b) the tendering of an apology; or
- 9 (c) any other response to the complaint that the complaints sub-committee
- recommends or to which the parties agree.
- 11 (3) As part of a settlement, the complaints sub-committee may request a satisfactory
- assurance by the respondent of the non-repetition of the conduct that was the
- subject matter of the complaint or any similar conduct.
- 14 (4) If the parties reach a settlement, the complaints sub-committee must record the settlement
- in writing and supply a copy to the complainant and respondent.

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17 Section 20. Procedure if no settlement.

- 18 (1) If the parties are unable to reach a settlement, the complaints sub-committee must make a
- preliminary recommendation for resolving the complaint, which may:
- 20 (a) be based on information already held:
- 21 (b) be based on any further information requested and supplied by the complainant or
- 22 the respondent; or
- 23 (c) follow a hearing or any other reasonable procedure the complaints sub-committee

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1			specifies.
2	(2)	The co	omplaints sub-committee must:
3		(a)	advise the parties of the preliminary recommendation, and what further action, if
4			any, the complaints sub-committee proposes should be taken by either or both
5			parties; and
6		(b)	provide the parties with a reasonable opportunity to advise acceptance or rejection

9		opport	cunity to provide views or representations, the complaints sub-committee may,
10		if the p	parties have reached a settlement, issue a recommendation that is to be final

14	Section	n 21.	Referral to the Attorney-General.
15	(1)	The C	ommittee may take appropriate legal action if it decides that:
16		(a)	a person or group of persons is engaged in a practice that is in violation of this
17			Act;
18		(b)	there is a significant violation of human rights which raises issues of public
19			interest;
20		(c)	no other method of dealing with an issue or complaint is likely to be successful;
21			or
22		(d)	it does not have the competency or resources to investigate the complaint or the
23			complaint is outside its jurisdiction.

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1	(2)	On the direction of the Committee, the Chairperson of the Committee may refer to the
2		Attorney-General, with a view to prosecution, any suspected offense under this Act or
3		any other Act.
4	(3)	Upon the application of any of the parties to a complaint or on the direction of the
5		Committee, the Chairperson of the Committee may refer the complaint to the Attorney-
6		General if:
7		(a) a complaints sub-committee is unable to make a final recommendation on the
8		complaint; or
9		(b) the respondent to the complaint has not complied with the terms of a final
10		recommendation within 30 days or any longer time the Committee allows.
11	(4)	The Attorney-General must decide, in a timely manner, whether a complaint received
12		under subsection (3) should proceed by way of prosecution for an offence under this Act
13		or any other Act.
14	(5)	No evidence is admissible in any court of any information, statement or admission
15		disclosed or made during the course of any proceedings of the complaints sub-committee
16		during any attempt to reach a settlement.
17	(6)	The Attorney-General may dismiss a matter brought before it which it considers
18		manifestly ill-founded or not sufficiently substantiated.
19		
20		PART V - OFFENSES AND PENALTIES
21		
22	Section	on 22. Offenses and Penalties.
23	(1)	A person must not:

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1		(a) provide false or misleading information to the Committee, a complaints sub-
2		committee, or other sub-committee in the exercise of its functions under this Act;
3		(b) assault, obstruct, or hinder a person acting on the authority of the Committee, a
4		complaints sub-committee, or other sub-committee; or
5		(c) obstruct or hinder, in any other way, the work of a complaints sub-committee.
6	(2)	A representative of a member of the Committee, Working Group, complaints sub-
7		committee, or other sub-committee, must not:
8		(a) contravene section 15 by releasing, without authorization, confidential
9		information; or
10		(b) use, for personal gain (or the gain of any other person), any information obtained
11		through the Committee, Working Group, complaints sub-committee, or other sub-
12		committee.
13	(3)	A person who contravenes subsection (1) or (2) commits an offense, and on conviction is
14		liable to a fine not exceeding \$5,000 or to imprisonment for a term not exceeding one
15		year, or both.
16	(4)	In addition to the offenses and penalties specified under this Act, offenses and
17		corresponding penalties relating to violations of human rights in the Bill of Rights and
18		other legislation, including the following, apply:
19		(a) Domestic Violence Protection and Prevention Act 2011;
20		(b) Child Protection Act 2015;
21		(c) Rights of Persons with Disabilities Act 2015;
22		(d) Criminal Code.
