JOINT REGULATION

No. 11 of

To control Conditions of Employment made by the Resident Commissioners under the provisions of paragraph 2 of Article 2, Article 7 and Article 31 of the Anglo-French Protocol, 1914.

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PART I

GENERAL PROVISIONS

1. The Native Recruiting and Employment Registration Joint Repeals. Regulation No. 20 of 1941, the Trade Union and Trade Disputes Regulation No. 8 of 1957 as amended by Joint Regulation No. 8 of 1958 and Joint Regulation No. 3 of 1962 and the Labour Advisory Committee Joint Regulation No. 16 of 1962 are hereby repealed.

2. (1) This Joint Regulation shall be applied in the New Hebrides Condominium.

Application.

(2) Any person, whatever may be his sex or nationality, who indertakes to put his services in return for remuneration under the frection or authority of another person, or corporate body, whether ablic or private, shall be considered as a worker for the purposes this Regulation:

Definition of worker.

Provided that the following shall not be so considered—

- (a) persons appointed to permanent employment by a public administration;
- (b) seamen;
- (c) aircrew;
- (d) teaching staff;
- (e) the staff of ecclesiastical bodies;
- (f) employees of local authorities or public services who do not give their full time to the said bodies or services, whose employment with such authorities or services does not represent their principal occupation and who are remunerated at a flat rate.
- This Regulation shall not apply to persons who are working bbing contractors or in pursuance of a contract for the harvestof crops and whose conditions of work may be the subject of Rules made by the Resident Commissioners.
- (1) No person shall exact, procure, or employ forced or pulsory labour.

By forced or compulsory labour is meant all work or which is exacted from any person under the menace of any

Forced

enalty, and for which the said person has not offered himself bluntarily, but does not mean—

- (a) any work or service exacted from any person as a consequence of a conviction in a Court of Law: Provided that the said work or service shall be carried out under the supervision and control of a public authority and that the said person shall not be hired to or placed at the disposal of private individuals, companies or associations;
- (b) any work or service exacted in cases of emergency, that is to say, in the event of war, or of a calamity or threatened calamity such as fire, flood, famine, earthquake, violent epidemic or animal disease, invasion by animal or vegetable pests, and in general any circumstances that would endanger the existence of the well-being of the whole or part of the population;
- (c) any minor village work of a kind performed by members of a community in the direct interest of such community and which is therefore a civic obligation normally incumbent upon members of such community:

Provided always that before exaction of such minor communal services consultation shall have been had with the inhabitants of the community or their direct representatives in regard to the need for such services.

- 4. The Resident Commissioners may make Joint Rules to firm the recruitment of workers and without derogation from generality of the foregoing, for all or any of the following poses—
- (a) the definition of recruiting operations;
- (b) the closing of areas to recruiting;
- (c) the employment of recruiting agents;
- (d) the conduct of recruiting operations;
- (e) the issue of licences to recruiters;
- the medical examination of recruited workers:
- (g) the conditions of transport for recruited workers;
- (h) the repatriation of recruited workers;
- the payment of advances to workers being recruited;
- the recruitment of workers for work in the New Hebrides from a territory outside;
- the recruitment of workers in the New Hebrides for work outside the territory.

PART II

NTRACTS OF EMPLOYMENT AND TERMINATION OF CONTRACT

(1) Contracts shall be drawn up freely in whatever form suitable to the parties concerned and proof of the existence agreement may be afforded in any way desired:

Form of contract.

Provided that any contract which is valid for a specified period ding six months or necessitates the residence of workers away their normal place of residence as defined in Section 45 (3) of Regulation shall be in writing and shall be submitted to the sector of Labour for his approval not later than one month after date of signature.

- (2) Any amendment made to such a contract in accordance an agreement between the parties concerned shall also be subject uch approval.
- (3) If the Inspector of Labour disapproves of any contract as ing to be drawn in compliance with any provision of this Regulate shall immediately—
 - (a) notify the employer and worker of in what respect the contract fails so to comply; and
 - (b) request the said employer to amend the said contract so as so to comply.
- (4) On receipt of such a notification and request the employer fredraw the contract so as to comply with the provisions of this plation and shall within thirty days re-submit the said contract the approval of the Inspector of Labour.
 - (5) If---
 - (a) any employer fails to re-submit the said contract within the prescribed period; or
 - (b) after re-submission the Inspector of Labour refuses to approve it, the said contract shall be null and void and the employer shall return the worker at the employer's own expense to his normal place of residence by the first available means of transport:

Provided that the employer's obligation to repatriate the worker under the provisions of this sub-section shall cease three months after the contract has become null and void.

- 6) No employer shall employ any worker after the worker's act has been rendered null and void by the operation of the sions of sub-section (5) of this Section.
- Where any worker is obliged to remain at his place of cyment awaiting transport to his normal place of residence his contract has become null and void the employer shall pay of the said worker's subsistence during the period that he mains.
- Where any contract is submitted by an employer to the tor of Labour for his approval and he does not within one from the date of the submission thereof notify the employer what respect it fails to comply with the provisions of this lation the said contract shall be deemed to have been approved.

- 6. (1) Every worker whose contract of employment is subject approval as provided for in sub-section (1) of Section 5 shall be famined by a recognised medical practitioner and declared fit for the rork that he will be called upon to perform by virtue of his contract: tovided that if it is impossible for the worker to be medically ramined before signature of the contract the Inspector of Labour hall fix the latest date by which the medical examination must take blace.
- (2) If a worker is found to be unfit for the work for which he as been engaged his contract shall automatically be terminated and by expense incurred on his return from the place of employment or his place of normal residence shall be borne by the employer if he worker has been brought to the place of work at the employer's spense.
- 7. (1) The contract shall state the name of the employer and the worker, the nature of the employment, the amount of wages be paid, the duration of the contract, and where appropriate, any ecial conditions of employment, housing, rations or transport.
- (2) Written contracts shall be exempt from all stamp duty and gistration fees.
- 8. (1) Contracts signed outside the New Hebrides and which to be executed in the New Hebrides shall be submitted to the pector of Labour for his approval not later than one month after arrival of the worker in the Group.
- (2) Sub-sections (3), (4), (5), (6), (7) and (8) of Section 5 shall by to contracts signed outside the New Hebrides which are to be cuted in the New Hebrides.
- (1) A contract for a specified period shall not cease to have that the wish of only one of the parties thereto except in the unstances specially provided for therein or in the case of a serious
- (2) The following shall be considered as serious offences for purposes of this Section and of Section 16—
- (a) misconduct:
- (b) wilful disobedience;
- (c) assault:
- habitual (or substantial) neglect of duty;
- repeated unjustified absence from work without leave;
- drunkenness of a kind liable to have a serious effect upon work:
- toyided that the foregoing definition shall not be exclusive and ed further that the Joint Court shall, in case of litigation, what constitutes a serious offence within the meaning of this

Medical examination.

- (3) Any unjustified breach of contract by one of the parties all entitle the other party to claim damages.
- 10. The maximum duration of a worker's employment that my be stipulated or implied in any contract shall in no case exceed ree years:

Period of contract.

Provided that in the case of a married man if he is to be uncompanied by his family at the place of employment during the heract period the maximum duration so stipulated or implied—

- (a) if the distance between the worker's normal place of residence and the place of employment within the New Hebrides exceeds fifty kilometres shall not exceed twelve months; and
- (b) if the worker's normal place of residence is within a territory other than that of the place of employment shall not exceed two years.
- 11. When a worker who has wrongfully broken a contract for ecified or unspecified period takes service with a new employer, new employer shall be liable jointly and severally with the said ker for any prejudice caused to the former employer if he has leed the employee, either directly or through a third person, to his former employment or if he has engaged or continued to loy a worker whom he knew to be already bound by a contract.

Crimping.

2. (1) A contract for an unspecified period may at any time minated at the wish of one of the two parties:

ctovided that notice shall be given by the party proposing to mate.

Termination for contract for an unspecified period.

- At the request of any worker who has been dismissed the sal shall be confirmed in writing within eight days.
- If a contract is broken without proper notice payment of usation in pursuance of the provisions of Section 16 of this ution shall not preclude an action for damages.
 - (1) Every contract of employment for an unspecified shall be subject to a period or trial of 15 days. This period increased to a maximum of six months, including renewals, ement between the parties to the contract.

At the expiry of the period of trial, during which a contract terminated at any time, notice of intention to terminate shall bulsory.

In the absence of any more favourable special provisions ed in a written contract the period of notice applicable to all hall be, irrespective of the manner in which the wage is

Period of trial,

Period of notice.

- (a) one hour for every hourly or daily paid worker;
- (b) seven days for every weekly paid worker;
- (c) fifteen days for every fortnightly-paid worker;

Provided that if the worker has less than one year's service with his employer notice shall be one week;

(d) thirty days for every monthly-paid worker:

Provided that if the worker has less than one year's service with his employer notice shall be fifteen days;

- (e) seven days for every domestic servant.
- 15. (1) During the period of notice the employer and the orker shall respect all the reciprocal obligations incumbent upon nem.

Obligations during period of notice.

- (2) So that he may look for other employment a worker shall, tring the period of notice, have one day off work weekly which ay be taken in one day or hour by hour and shall be paid at full ages.
- (3) Any party in regard to whom these obligations are not beeted shall not be obliged to respect the period of notice and thing that is herein contained shall affect the right of such party bring an action for damages before the Joint Court.
- 16. If a contract drawn up for an unspecified period is broken hout notice or without the full period of notice observed the party consible shall be obliged to pay to the other party a sum in pensation, the amount of which shall be equal to the wages and er benefits of whatever nature they may be, which the worker all have received during that part of the notice period that has not a respected:

Breach of contract.

Provided that a contract may be terminated without notice in asse of a serious offence subject to assessment of its gravity by the Court.

(1) At the demand of a worker whose contract has d his employer shall give him a certificate indicating only the of his commencing and leaving work, the kind of work on the was employed and the dates of whatever post he may have

Certificate of employment.

Such certificates shall be exempt from all registration

If a change occurs in the existing state of affairs of an king as a result of sale, inheritance, formation of a company other cause, every contract current at the time of such change main in force between the new employer and the staff of the king.

Change in situation of undertaking.

19. (1) If any worker is absent from work as a result of illness duly certified by a medical practitioner his contract of employment shall be deemed to be suspended during the period of such absence for a maximum of six months.

Absence from work as a result of illness.

(2) Every worker absent from work as a result of illness duly certified by a medical practitioner shall be entitled to receive from his employer sickness pay equivalent to half wages for a period not exceeding the period of notice of termination of employment to which he is subject:

Provided that such entitlement may only be exercised once in the same year.

PART III

COLLECTIVE AGREEMENTS AND TRADE UNIONS

20. (1) In this Regulation "collective agreement" means any feement relating to conditions of employment made between one more trade unions or worker's trade associations on the one hand done or more employer's associations or one or more employers ting individually on the other.

Collective agreements.

- (2) Any collective agreement may provide for conditions that more favourable, and shall not provide for conditions that are favourable, to the worker than those provided by law.
- (3) Every collective agreement shall determine the area for ich it is valid which may be either territory-wide or local.
 - (4) The Resident Commissioners may make Joint Rules for better carrying out of the provisions of this Section.
 - 41. "Trade Unions" means Unions and Associations which concerned with the study and defence of economic, industrial, dercial and agricultural interests and with the regulation of the lons between workers and employers.

Interpretation of "Trade Unions".

The purposes of any Trade Union shall not, by reason that they are in restraint of trade, be deemed to be unlawful to render any Member of such Trade Union liable to criminal aution for conspiracy or otherwise.

Trade Unions not criminal.

The purposes of any Trade Union shall not, by reason that they are in restraint of trade, be unlawful so as to render le any agreement or trust.

Trade
Unions not
unlawful for
civil
purposes.

Persons exercising or engaged in the same profession or or similar professions or trades, may form a Trade Union in ance with the provisions of this Regulation.

Formation of Trade Unions.

The Resident Commissioners may jointly appoint such as they may think fit to be Registrar of Trade Unions, herereferred to as the Registrar.

Registrar of Trade Unions. 26. Every Trade Union shall be registered in accordance with provisions of this Regulation, or be dissolved within three months the date—

Compulsory Registration.

- (a) of its formation, or
- (b) of any notification by the Registrar that he has refused to register the Trade Union under Section 27.
- 27. (1) An application to register the Trade Union and its les shall be sent to the Registrar with copies of the Rules and a of the titles and names of the Officers of the Trade Union. If Registrar is satisfied that—

(a) the applicants have been duly authorised to apply for registration, and

- (b) the purposes of the Trade Union are lawful, and
- c) the application is in conformity with the provisions of this Regulation;

shall register the Trade Union and Rules and issue a Certificate Registration. Should he not be so satisfied he may refuse registra-

- (2) An appeal shall lie to the Joint Court from the refusal of Registrar to register a Trade Union and on such appeal being de, the Court may make any such order as it thinks proper, uding directions as to the costs of the appeal. Any such order the Court shall be final.
- 28. (1) It shall be lawful for the Registrar to cancel the istration of any Trade Union—
- (a) at the request of the Trade Union,
- (b) on proof to his satisfaction that a Certificate of Registration has been obtained by fraud or mistake, or that such Trade Union has wilfully, and after notice from the Registrar, violated any of the provisions of this Regulation, or has ceased to exist.
- An appeal from the decision of the Registrar under this on shall lie to the Joint Court subject to the same conditions as govided for in Section 27 (2).
 - Every alteration of the Rules of a registered Trade Union be registered with the Registrar and shall take effect from the registration unless some later date is specified in the Rules.

Alteration of Rules.

Cancellation

Registration,

The Officers of a Trade Union, who may be men or women, for unmarried, shall be more than twenty-one years of age all not have been convicted of an offence connected with sty.

Officers.

Rules for Registry. 31. Minors over the age of sixteen may be Members of a Trade Union unless their father, mother or guardian is opposed to such Membership.

Minors may be Members.

32. Persons who have given up their employment or their profession may continue to be Members of a Trade Union provided that they have exercised their employment or profession for at least one year.

Continued membership of a Trade Union.

33. Any Member of a Trade Union may resign at any time despite any provisions to the contrary in the Rules of the Trade Union without prejudice to the right of the Trade Union to claim from him his subscription to the Trade Union for six months following resignation.

Resignation of Members.

34. In the event of the dissolution of a Trade Union, whether in accordance with its Rules or as a result of a Court order, its property shall be disposed of in accordance with its Rules, or in default of any provision in the Rules in accordance with the procedure laid down by a General Meeting called for that purpose. In the case may it be distributed among the Members.

Dissolution of Trade Unions.

35. Trade Unions shall be bodies corporate. They shall have be right to institute legal proceedings and to acquire, either as a lift, or for consideration, property whether movable or immovable.

Trade Unions to be bodies corporate.

36. Trade Unions may in any Court having jurisdiction ercise all the rights of a party in a civil suit in respect of matters such directly or indirectly injure the collective interests of the dustry, profession or trade which they represent.

Rights of Trade Unions in civil suits.

37. (1) An action against a Trade Union, whether of workers employers, or against any Members or Officials thereof on behalf themselves and all other Members of the Trade Union in respect any tortious act alleged to have been committed by or on behalf the Trade Union, shall not be entertained by any Civil Court.

Immunity of Trade Unions from actions for tort.

(2) Nothing in this Section shall affect the liability of a Trade on or any Official thereof to be sued in any Civil Court touching oncerning the property or rights of a Trade Union, except in sect of a tortious act committed by or on behalf of the Union in emplation or in furtherance of a trade dispute, as defined in 110 of this Regulation.

8. An act done in pursuance of an agreement or combination of or more persons shall, if done in contemplation or furtherance addedispute not be actionable unless the act, if done without uch agreement or combination, would be actionable.

Conspiracy in relation to Trade Disputes. An act done by a person in contemplation or furtherance de dispute shall not be actionable on the ground only that as some other person to break a contract of employment or an interference with the trade, business, or employment of her person, or with the right of some other person to dispose apital or his labour as he will.

Removal of liability for interfering with another person's business.

Trade Unions properly constituted in accordance with the ons of this Regulation may freely combine for the study and of their economic, industrial, commercial and agricultural is. No restriction shall be placed on the manner in which they ombine.

Combination of Trade Unions.

The provisions of Sections 21, 26, 27, 29, 30 and 31, are able to combinations of Trade Unions, which must moreover known in the manner prescribed in Section 27 the name and juarters of the Trade Unions which they comprise. The itution of combinations of Trade Unions shall prescribe the er in which the Trade Unions which form the combination are sented in the Group Council and at General Meetings.

Combinations of Trade Unions.

2. Combinations of Trade Unions shall enjoy all the rights rred upon individual Trade Unions.

Rights of Combinations of Trade Unions.

PART IV

WAGES

Chapter I-Determination of Wages

43. Subject to the provisions of this Part of this Regulation, as shall be the same for all workers, whatever may be their origin, age, or status, whenever conditions of work, trade qualifications output are equal.

Equal pay.

44. The Resident Commissioners may, after consulting the our Advisory Committee, make Joint Rules fixing—

Minimum wages and wage zones.

- a) wage zones and guaranteed minimum wages applicable to all trades;
- (b) minimum wages for certain trades.

mmodation, in accordance with the standards prescribed in Rules for any worker, together with his wife and dependent en, whose normal place of residence is not at or near his place apployment and who cannot by his own means obtain such mmodation

Housing

The rental value of accommodation provided under the sons of this Section shall be fixed by Joint Rules.

For the purposes of this Section any worker who has been it to his place of employment at his employer's expense shall

be deemed to have his normal place of residence away from his place of employment.

- 46. (1) Every employer shall provide rations, in accordance with the scales prescribed by Joint Rules, for those of his workers who are unable by their own means to obtain for themselves and their dependants a regular supply of the basic items of food.
- (2) The reimbursement value of such rations shall also be fixed by Joint Rules.
- 47. Wages for task or piece work shall be calculated in such a way as to provide a worker of average ability working normally wages at least equal to that of a worker remunerated on a time basis.
- 48. Minimum rates of wages and conditions of remuneration of task or piece work shall be posted up at the offices of the employer and at the place where the workers are paid.

49. Except when otherwise agreed by the parties concerned no rages shall be due to any worker who is absent from work for any eason other than the cases provided for in this Regulation.

Minimum rates to be posted up.

Ration.

Wages not due in case of absence.

Chapter II-Payment of Wages

50. (1) Wages shall be paid in legal tender notwithstanding by provision to the contrary.

Wages to be paid in legal tender.

- (2) Payment of all or part of wages in alcohol or alcolic liquor prohibited.
- (3) The payment of all or part of wages in kind is also proited subject to the provisions of Sections 45 and 46 of this gulation.
- (4) Wages shall be paid, except in cases of force majeure, at the of work or at the office of the employer when it is near to the of work.
- (5) Wages shall in no case be paid in an establishment for the of liquor or a shop, except to those workers who are normally loyed there.
- (6) Wages shall not be paid on a day when the worker is Ged to rest.
 - (1) Wages shall be paid at regular intervals not exceeding ys to every worker whose remuneration is calculated by the the day or the week and monthly to every other worker: tovided that when, in pursuance of this subsection, wages are wice monthly the employer may pay allowances and accessories ges each month.

Intervals

- (2) Wages shall be paid not later than eight days after the end of the period to which they apply.
- (3) In cases of termination or breach of contract, wages and allowances, including where appropriate, payments in lieu of holidays, shall be paid as soon as the service has ceased:

Provided that, in the case of litigation, the employer may obtain from the Joint Court an order enabling him to retain provisionally his hands all or part of the wages which is seizable by virtue of section 60 of this Regulation.

52. (1) Payment of wages shall be recorded on a document pepared or certified by the employer or his representative and itialled by each payee:

Provided that if the worker is unable to sign his name he shall tark the said document with his thumbprint.

- (2) These documents shall be preserved by the employer in same way as accountancy documents and shall be presented to Inspector of Labour on demand.
- (3) Except where otherwise authorised by the Resident Comssioners the employer shall give an individual pay voucher to the the time of payment of wages if the worker request such bucher.
- (4) This voucher shall be in any form that it is convenient for employer to adopt but shall mention the name of the employer of the worker and give details of the way in which the remunerations been calculated.
- 33. (1) No statement such as "received in full settlement of laims" made by the worker during the period of his contract or its termination, shall have the effect of waiving any rights he have under the said contract.

The acceptance without protest or reservation by a worker pay document shall not be held to imply renunciation on his of the payment of all or part of wages, allowances and other sories to wages which may be due to him in law or by virtue of intract and such acceptance may not be held to imply the ment of all claims.

(1) No sum due to a contractor undertaking any works the nature of public works shall be the subject of a garnishee for shall payment thereof be stopped to the prejudice of the to whom wages are due.

Sums due to workers in wages shall be paid in priority over the to suppliers.

The term "wages" shall include not only wages properly but also accessories to wages and, where appropriate, wages of notice and holiday pay.

Wages documents.

> Acceptance by worker of pay no bar to subsequent proceedings.

Guarantees as regards wages. 55. No proceedings may be instituted by a worker for the recovery of wages after the expiry of one year.

Period of limitation

Chapter III-Deductions from Wages

56. An employer shall not impose fines.

Fines prohibited.

Deductions

from wages.

57. (1) Except for compulsory deductions, reimbursements consented to under the Joint Rules provided for in Sections 45 and 46 and any deposits which may be provided for by contract, no deductions from salaries may take place other than as a result of a garnishee order or of a deduction consented to before the Inspector of Labour for the reimbursement of agreed advances of money made by the employer to the worker:

Provided that when the Inspector of Labour lives more than 3 kms. away, deductions may be made by mutual and written content and such consent shall be sent to the said Inspector not later than one month after its signature.

- (2) Money given on account of work in progress shall not be onsidered as an advance.
- 58. An employer may not make deductions from the wages to his workers in respect of sums owing to himself:

Provided that compulsory deductions in respect of reimbursecuts provided for in Sections 45 and 46 and deposits provided for contract shall not be subject to such restriction. Deductions when permissible.

59. Any employer who has made an advance in cash may be illursed by means of successive voluntary deductions consented the way prescribed in Section 57 and within the limits laid down section 60.

Reimbursement of advances.

0. (1) Wages shall be subject to seizure or voluntary transfer one-fifth of that part of wages that is less than or equal to 6 per month; up to one-quarter of that part exceeding \$A. 96 ess than or equal to \$A. 120; up to one-third of that part ding \$A. 120 and less than or equal to \$A. 150; up to one-half at part exceeding \$A. 150 and less than or equal to \$A. 300 without limitation for the part of wages exceeding this last

Method of calculating deductions.

In calculating deductions, account shall be taken not only see properly speaking but also of all accessories to wages with ception of allowances declared to be non-seizable by the legisin force, of sums paid as reimbursement of expenses incurred worker and of family allowances.

The Resident Commissioners may make Joint Rules the proportions and limitations fixed in subsection (1) of tion.

Chapter IV—Employer's Shops and Plantation Stores

61. (1) In this chapter "shop" means any arrangement whereby the employer directly or indirectly sells or supplies goods exclusively to the workers in his undertaking for their personal and ordinary needs.

Employer's shop condition to which subject.

- (2) An employer may establish a shop on condition—
- (a) that workers are not obliged to make purchases therein;
- (b) that the sale of goods shall be made therein exclusively on a
 - (c) that the accounts of the shop shall be kept separate from the accounts of other undertakings of the employer and shall be readily available for inspection by the Inspector of Labour.
- (3) The prices of goods on sale shall be displayed in a legible manner.
- (4) Every shop, other than a workers co-operative operated y an undertaking for the exclusive purpose of selling goods to the workers thereof shall be subject to the provisions of this Section.
- 62. The opening of a shop under the provisions of Section 16 hall be subject to an authorisation given by the Inspector of Labour.

Opening of shop subject to authorisation.

63. (1) The operation of every employer's shop shall be pervised by the Inspector of Labour.

Operation of shop to be supervised.

- (2) If any abuse is found the Inspector of Labour may order provisional closure of an employer's shop for a maximum period one month.
- (3) The Resident Commissioners, acting jointly, may on the ommendation of the Inspector of Labour order the permanent sure of any employer's shop.
- When an employer sells or supplies goods to the public when in the absence of any other source of supply close to the of work his workers are obliged to provision themselves in his the manner in which such sales or supplies are made shall be left to inspection by the Inspector of Labour who shall have the to fix maximum prices based on the prices currently charged to Group.

Control of prices by Inspector of Labour.

PART V

CONDITIONS OF WORK

Chapter I-Hours of Work

(1) In all undertakings whether public or private including table or educational establishments the normal hours of work incloses of both sexes of any age whether working on a time,

Normal hours of work. piece or task basis shall not exceed 44 hours per week.

- (2) Work carried out in excess of the normal hours of work sall give rise to the payment of overtime.
 - (3) Such overtime shall be paid at the following rates—
 - (a) for public holidays and Sundays: at a minimum rate equal to one-and-a-half times the normal hourly rate;
 - (b) for work carried out in excess of the normal weekly hours of work—
 - (i) for the first four hours: at a minimum rate equal to one-and-a-quarter times the normal hourly wage;
 - (ii) in excess of four hours: at a minimum rate equal to one-and-a-half times the normal hourly wage;
 - (c) for work carried out at night from 8 p.m. to 4 a.m. in excess of the normal weekly hours of work: a minimum rate equal to one-and-three-quarter times the normal hourly wage.
 - (4) In all agricultural undertakings the hours of work shall be culated on the basis of a yearly total of 2,400 hours.
 - 66. (1) The period of attendance deemed to be equivalent to nours of effective work may be extended to 52 hours in respect attain categories of worker whose employment, because of its inittent nature, involves long period of inaction. The categories high these provisions shall apply shall be fixed by Joint Rules.

Permanent extensions of working hours.

(2) The weekly period of attendance required of any watchman retaker may be extended to a maximum of 66 hours if he is not do not the premises of the undertaking and shall be continuous shoused on the said premises:

rovided that every such watchman or caretaker shall be given kly period of rest of not less than 24 consecutive hours and easatory paid holiday of not less than 12 working days per

Any worker whose working hours are extended by virtue section shall be paid wages as if he had worked for 44 hours

The working hours of any worker employed on preparatory plementary work which necessarily has to be carried out outgeneral working hours of the undertaking may be legally d by one hour per diem and such hours shall be paid at the trate.

Working hours for preparatory work.

(1) The working hours prescribed in Section 65 may be in undertakings where, owing to the nature of the work out, continuous shift working takes place:

Working hours for shift work Provided that the average weekly working hours shall not exceed 6 hours, and provided further that holidays given to a worker in 60 of his weekly day of rest shall not be affected thereby.

- (2) Work carried out by virtue of the provision of this Section hall be remunerated at an increased rate.
- (3) The Resident Commissioners may if necessary make Joint ules fixing the categories of work to which the provisions of this ection shall apply.
- 69. (1) Effective working hours may temporarily be extended found the normal hours worked in the undertaking or beyond the hour week in the case of—

Temporary extension of working hours.

- (a) urgent work which is necessary to prevent imminent accidents or to repair the damage caused by any accident which affects the operation of the undertaking. In such cases there shall be no limit to the hours which may be worked on the first day and two additional hours may be worked on each following by virtue of these provisions shall be paid at normal rate;
- (b) exceptional work or of an unusual increase in work. In such cases working hours may be extended by four hours on the first day and two hours on each following day up to a maximum of one week. Hours worked by virtue of these provisions shall be paid at overtime rates.
- (2) Temporary extensions of working hours may be affected
- (a) without authorisation in the case of exceptional work arising from normally unforeseeable circumstances subject to the submission of a written report to the Inspector of Labour; or
- b) with the approval of the Inspector of Labour upon submission of a written application in the case of additional work necessitated by foreseeable circumstances.
- In any undertaking where seasonal reductions in activity working time lost as a result thereof may be recovered at peak

Recovery of lost working time.

tovided that such recovery shall be subject to approval by the cor of Labour who shall fix the length of the recovery period be length of the working day.

(1) In cases of general stoppage of work resulting from stal causes or cases of force majeure, with the exception of stales a result of strikes or lockouts, the working day may be with a view to recovery of time lost. Time lost on public may also be so recovered.

Working time lost.

- (2) The total number of hours recovered in this manner shall not exceed 100 per annum or lead to a working day in excess of line hours.
- (3) Such recovery shall be effected during working days, shall not affect the weekly day of rest and shall be notified to the Inspector of Labour.
- 72. In each undertaking there shall be a timetable fixing the faily working hours. This timetable, together with any changes made fiereto shall be permanently exhibited in such a way that it may be fail by all staff of the undertaking.

Timetable.

73. The provisions of this Chapter shall not be applicable to nanagerial staff occupying posts of responsibility or to domestic ervants.

Managerial staff and domestic

Chapter II-Employment of Women

- 74. For the purposes of this Chapter—
- (a) "night" means the interval between seven o'clock in the evening and six o'clock the next morning; and
- (b) "woman" includes all persons of the female sex regardless of age.
- 5. Women shall not be employed during the night in any taking, except where the night work—
- h) has to do with raw materials or materials in course of treatment which are subject to rapid deterioration;
- is necessitated by an emergency which it was impossible to foresee and which is not of a recurring character;
 - is that of a responsible position of management held by a woman who is not ordinarily engaged in manual work;
- is that of nursing and of caring for the sick, or other health or welfare work, including work in pharmacy;
 - is carried on in a cinematograph or other theatre while such theatre is open to the public;
 - is carried on in connection with a hotel or guest house, or with a bar, restaurant or club;
 - is authorised by the Resident Commissioners in conformity with international conventions.

The Resident Commissioners may by Joint Rules from the suspend the prohibition of the employment of women he night when in case of serious emergency the public interest ads.

Prohibition of employment of women at night.

- 77. No woman shall be employed on underground work in any mine, provided that this section shall not apply—
 - (a) to women holding positions of management who do not perform manual labour;
 - (b) to women employed in health or welfare services;
 - (c) to women who, in the course of their studies, spend a period of training in the underground parts of a mine; or
 - (d) to any other women who may occasionally have to enter the underground parts of a mine for the purpose of a nonmanual occupation.

 - 79. No employer shall give notice of dismissal to a woman loyee who is absent in pursuance of the provisions of subons (1) or (2) of Section 78 or who remains absent as a result of certified by a medical practitioner to arise out of pregnancy infinement and rendering her unfit for work:

provided that such additional absence from work shall not three weeks.

- (a) underground in any mine unless he had attained the age of sixteen and produces a medical certificate attesting his fitness for such work;
- (b) on any ship as a trimmer or stoker except on a ship mainly propelled by means other than steam:

Provided a person between the ages of sixteen and eighteen may be employed as a trimmer or stoker on a ship exclusively engaged in the coastal trade if he is certified by a medical practitioner to be physically fit for such work;

(c) on any kind of work on a ship unless certified by a medical practitioner to be fit for such work:

Provided that in urgent cases the Inspector of Labour may permit the embarkation of a person under the age of eighteen without prior medical examination, and in such case the employer shall at his own expense have such a person medically examined at the first place of call at which there is a medical practitioner, and should such practitioner not attest such person as fit for the work, the employer shall at his own expense return such person as a passenger to the port or place where he was engaged, or to his home, whichever is the nearer:

Provided that a person over the age of sixteen may be so employed with the permission in writing of the Inspector of Labour.

87. Every worker shall be entitled to a weekly rest of twentyconsecutive hours which shall normally fall on a Sunday except ere another day has been fixed by agreement between worker and ployer or in any trades where it is usual to take another day:

Provided that in any undertaking where work is continuous and re simultaneous taking of the day of rest by all the staff would to the prejudice of either the public or the proper working of the dertaking the management may grant the weekly day of rest by lation or may divide it into two half-days. Chapter V-Holidays and Transport

In this Chapter "effective service" shall mean periods of actually worked together with periods of absence caused by-

an accident at work duly certified by a recognised medical practitioner;

illness arising from employment duly certified by a recognised medical practitioner;

maternity leave up to a maximum period of six weeks;

illness duly certified by a recognised medical practitioner up to a maximum period of three months.

(1) Except where more favourable conditions are d for in individual contracts, entitlement to paid holidays acquired at the rate of one working day for each month of

ovided that in agricultural undertakings such entitlement shall ared at the rate of one working day for each two months of service.

When the number of working days calculated in this is not a complete number the length of the holiday shall be to the nearest complete number above.

Provided that he has carried out a minimum of six months Bervice with the same employer, and subject to the provisions tion (1) of this Section and Section 90 of this Regulation, orker in employment at the date when this Regulation comes

Definition of effective

- (4) The length of the holiday provided for in subsection (1) of is Section shall be increased at the rate of two working days after enty years, by four working days after twenty-five years and by working days after thirty years service in the same undertaking, hether continuous or not.

 - (a) in the case of any worker employed on a contract for a specified period: at the expiry of the contract;

Provided that such worker shall have the right at his own request to accumulate his entitlement to holiday for a period of two years and provided further that this period may be extended to a maximum of three years by agreement with the employer.

 Provided that if the employer and the worker so agree such

- 2) If the employer and the worker so agree, the holiday, or of its parts, may be taken wholly or partly in advance before orker has acquired entitlement thereto.

Remuneration during holiday. 93. (1) If a contract of employment expires or is broken fore the worker has acquired entitlement to holiday, an allowance iculated on the basis of the entitlement provided for in Section 89 this Regulation shall be paid in the place of holiday.

Entitlement when contract terminated.

Provided that where the contract has been broken by the orker such allowance shall only be payable on condition that the orker has accomplished at least six months effective service and ovided further that in the case of hourly or daily paid workers month's effective service shall mean twenty-two days work bried out within the month.

- (2) The Resident Commissioners may make Joint Rules ying the period of effective service and the equivalent provided respectively in subsection (1) of this Section.
- 94. (1) Subject to the provisions of Section 97 of this inlation, every employer shall bear the travel costs of his workers, ther with their wives and dependent children—
- (a) between the worker's normal place of residence and his place of employment and between his place of employment and his place of normal residence;
 - (i) on the expiration of a contract for a specified period;
 - (ii) in the case of termination of a contract when the worker has acquired entitlement to paid holiday under the provisions of Section 89 of this Regulation;
 - (iii) in the case of breach of contract by the employer or as the result of a serious offence committed by the latter;
 - (iv) in the case of breach of contract due to the inability of the worker to fulfil the contract owing to sickness or accident:
 - (v) in the case of breach of contract due to force majeure; between the place of employment and the normal place of residence and vice versa in the case of normal holidays. Return travel to the place of employment shall only be paid for by the employer if the contract has not expired before the date on which the holiday ends and if the worker is on that date fit to resume work:

Provided that the contract of employment may prescribe a minimum tour not exceeding twelve months, below which the travel costs of the worker's family shall not be borne by the employer.

In this Section and in Section 96 of this Regulation the "travel costs" means the cost of the transport of persons se; the cost of subsistence during the journey and, where the cost of subsistence during the period between the piration, termination or breach of contract and the date

Payment of travel costs.

95. The worker's conditions of transport shall be determined his position in the undertaking in accordance with rules made the employer or by local usage:

Conditions of transport,

Provided that every employer shall ensure that the worker is an apported in proper conditions of comfort.

96. When a contract is terminated for any cause other than ose provided for in Section 94 of this Regulation or as a result of serious offence committed by the worker the employer shall bear wel costs proportionate to the length of the worker's service in spect of both the journey to and from his place of employment.

Proportional payment of travel costs.

97. After leaving the service of his former employer any worker by avail himself of his holiday entitlement and travel costs within maximum period of two years counting from the date on which eased to work for the said employer:

Duration of entitlement.

Provided that travel shall only be paid for by the employer if worker actually makes the journey.

Chapter VI—Safety Precautions and Medical Facilities

- 98. (1) Every employer shall take steps as soon as possible emedy any working conditions which may be dangerous for the 1th or welfare of his workers.
- 2) The Inspector of Labour may issue a written notice to any over recording any offences or dangerous conditions discovered taking the maximum period within which they shall be eliminated.
- 2. (1) Every employer shall within the shortest possible inform an Inspector of Labour, giving all relevant details, of cident at work or illness arising from work that has occurred undertaking.

Notification of accidents

Failing action by the employer such declaration may be by the worker concerned or his representative up to the end second year following the date of the accident or the first on which a medical examination revealed the existence of the action of the same arising from work.

(1) Every undertaking or establishment shall provide at aid in the case of an accident or illness befalling any worker, dependants if they are accommodated on the premises of the aking.

First-aid and medical treatment.

The employer shall send to the nearest medical centre any or sick persons to whom the necessary treatment cannot be the spot but who are in a fit state to be moved.

If the employer has not proper means of transport imavailable he shall inform the nearest District Agent as possible and the latter shall take the steps necessary to the patient

- (4) In the case of an accident at work any expenditure incurred nder the provisions of subsection (3) of this Section shall be funded by the employer to the administration at the official rate the transport of patients.
 - (5) Every employer shall have permanently available such dicines, dressings and equipment as are necessary for first-aid.

Chapter VII—Rules of Undertakings

101. (1) The management of any undertaking may make which shall relate exclusively to the technical organisation of work of the undertaking, to discipline and to requirements conning hygiene or safety necessary to the proper operation of the ertaking.

ments may make rules.

- (2) Before bringing such rules into force the management of undertaking shall submit them to the Inspector of Labour for loval, which may be withheld if they contain anything that is tary to the provisions of this Regulation.
 - (3) Rules shall be exhibited at the place of work.

PART VI

OPERATION AND ENFORCEMENT

Chapter I—Declaration of Enterprises and Staff

(1) Every undertaking, every establishment thereof, and ublic service employing workers, shall between the 1st and December each year forward to the Resident Commissioner time nationality or in the case of the joint public services and takings owned by New Hebrideans to both Resident sioners a declaration showing-

Declaration of staff to be made.

the date of opening of the establishment;

where appropriate, the date on which the Articles of Association were filed with the appropriate authorities;

the nature of the undertaking; and

the numbers of workers employed in the various trade categories of the undertaking on the 30th November immediately preceding the date of declaration:

Provided that paragraphs (a), (b) and (c) shall not apply to Public Services.

hese provisions shall not apply to domestic staff.

Every head of an undertaking or manager of an establishmake a declaration of the labour employed by the contractors. stors whose services he is using.

Chapter II-Employer's Register

104. Every employer shall keep permanently up to date at the place of work a register, known as the "Employer's Register", in such form as may be prescribed in Joint Rules:

Employer's Register.

Appointment of

Inspectors of Labour.

Provided that undertakings employing less than ten workers shall be exempt from the provisions of this section.

Chapter III-Inspection of Labour

105. (1) Each Power shall appoint an officer to carry out the lities of Inspector of Labour.

(2) In this Regulation and any Joint Rules made under the ovisions thereof and unless the contrary is stated, "Inspector of abour" shall mean the Inspector of Labour of the Power of which employer is a dependant and, when the employer is a New pridean, either Inspector of Labour:

Provided that when the employer is a New Hebridean the first pector of Labour to whom any dispute between such employer in his workers is referred shall alone be competent.

Powers of Inspectors.

- 106. (1) Every Inspector of Labour shall be empowered—
- (a) to enter without hindrance and without prior notice at any time of the day or night onto any premises subject to inspection;
- (b) to enter during the day time any premises which he may reasonably suppose to be subject to inspection;
- c) to carry out any investigation or enquiry considered necessary to ensure that the law is properly complied with and in particular—
 - (i) to question either alone or in the presence of witnesses any employer or worker regarding any matter relating to the application of the law;
 - (ii) to demand to inspect any books, registers, or documents that are required to be maintained by the laws controlling conditions of employment in order to satisfy himself that such books, registers or documents comply with the said laws, or in order to copy them or make extracts therefrom;
 - (iii) to require exhibition of any notices provided for by law;
 - (iv) to take and remove for the purpose of analysis a sample of any matter or substance used or handled by any worker:

Provided that the employer or his representative shall be informed that such matter or substance has been taken or removed for such purpose.

- (2) When making an inspection, the Inspector of Labour shall inform the employer or his representative of his presence unless he considers that by so doing he would prejudice the effectiveness of his inspection.
- 107. (1) Each Inspector of Labour may report offences against this Regulation and the Joint Rules made under the provisions thereof and such report shall be accepted as fact unless proof to the contrary is provided.

Inspectors may report offences.

- (2) Each Inspector of Labour shall be empowered to refer any peport direct to the Joint Court.
- (3) Every such report shall be communicated to the person concerned or to his representative by means of a certified true copy alling which any subsequent proceedings shall be null and void.
- 108. Every District Agent shall be a legal deputy of the ispector of Labour of his own nationality within his own district tien the Inspector is absent or for any reason unable to attend. Each Inspector of Labour may delegate all or part of his powers to District Agents of his own nationality.

District Agents.

109. A Labour Advisory Committee shall be set up to assist Resident Commissioners who shall make Joint Rules to determe its functions, membership and rules of operation.

PART VII

TRADE DISPUTES

"Trade Dispute" means any dispute between employers workers or between workers and workers, which is connected the employment or non-employment, or with the terms of the syment, or with the conditions of labour of any person.

Interpreta-

(1) Any worker or any employer may request the ctor of Labour to settle an individual trade dispute by con-

Individual Trade Disputes.

A memorandum recording conciliation or non-conciliation, case may be, shall be prepared by the Inspector of Labour speed by himself and the parties concerned. A memorandum ciliation shall be binding on all parties concerned.

If conciliation does not succeed either party to the dispute the matter before the Joint Court.

(1) Every collective trade dispute shall be referred to the late Inspector of Labour for conciliation.

Collective Trade Disputes.

If conciliation is not successful the dispute shall be d to the Resident Commissioners for the appointment of a Arbitration Board.

113. On receiving a report of a trade dispute of a collective nature the Resident Commissioners shall within seven days jointly appoint a Labour Arbitration Board to enquire into and advise upon the dispute. The composition, powers and procedure of Labour Arbitration Boards shall be laid down in Joint Rules by the Resident Commissioners:

Labour Arbitration Boards.

Offences.

Provided that such Boards shall be presided over by a Judge or udges of the Joint Court and the Members shall be persons with nowledge of labour problems.

114. (1) The members of any Trade Union or group of orkers who strike or the members of any Employer's Association group of employers who declare, or any employer who declares, lock-out without reporting a trade dispute of a collective nature a Labour Inspector in accordance with Section 112, or who, aving so reported such a dispute, do so before the appointment a Labour Arbitration Board under Section 113 or within thirty ys of such appointment, shall be guilty of an offence against this gulation and shall be liable—

- (a) in the case of employers, to payment to the workers of wages lost by them in consequence of the lock-out;
- (b) in the case of workers, to loss of the right of notice prior to dismissal and to damages for breach of contract;
- (c) in the further case of employers and by Joint Decision of the Resident Commissioners to forfeit the right for a period of two years to be members of any advisory committee on labour matters.
- (2) A strike or lock-out declared after publication of the logs of a Labour Arbitration Board or after the expiry of thirty from the appointment of the Board shall not constitute a breach entract.
- 15. The provisions of this Regulation shall not affect the y or rights of an existing Trade Union whatever may be the system to which it is subject. Such a Trade Union may at any be reconstituted under the provisions of this Regulation or samated with a Trade Union constituted under the said bions.

Any employer, his agent or servant who has wilfully or ly engaged, attempted to engage or retain in his employment or who is still bound to another employer by a contract of ment, an apprentice who is still bound by an agreement of teship or a trainee undergoing instruction in a technical establishment: and

(g) Any person who has demanded or accepted from any worker any financial consideration in return for having acted as an intermediary in connection with the settlement or payment of wages ar allowances or expenses of any kind.

hall for a first offence be liable, upon conviction, to a fine not exceed-Stg. 100 or to a term of imprisonment not exceeding three months, or to both such fine and imprisonment, and in the case of a cond or subsequent offence to a fine not exceeding £Stg. 200 or a m of imprisonment not exceeding six months or to both such fine nd imprisonment.

119. Any person who has obstructed or attempted to obstruct Inspector of Labour or his deputy in or upon the occasion of execution or exercise of the duties and powers conferred upon by this Regulation shall for a first offence be liable to a fine not eding £Stg. 100 or to a term of imprisonment not exceeding e months, or to both such fine and imprisonment.

Provided that in the case of a second offence such a person shall liable to a fine not exceeding £Stg. 200 or to a term of imprisonit not exceeding six months, or to both such fine and imprisonat, and provided further that in the case of a third or subsequent nce a sentence of imprisonment shall be mandatory.

- 120. (1) Any fine inflicted in pursuance of the provisions of Part shall be payable as many times as there have been offences: Provided that the total amount payable shall not exceed fifty the maximum rate fixed for the offence.
 - The provisions of subsection (1) of this Section shall in ular be applicable when several workers have been employed conditions which contravene this Regulation.

Rules.

- (2) Any clause of a contract of employment that is not in conformity with the provisions of this Regulation or of any Joint Rules made in application thereof shall be amended not later than six months after the date of signature of the said Regulation or Rules.
- 123. The Resident Commissioners may, acting jointly, make foint Rules for the better carrying out of the provisions of this Regulation.

124. This Regulation may be cited as the Joint Labour Regulation No. 11 of 1969 and shall come into operation on the date of its publication in the Condominium Gazette.
